Chrome 57 Comes with Upgrades

More than half of all internet users browse the web with Google's Chrome browser. So when a new version is released, that's a pretty big deal. And even by Chrome standards, the most recent improvements make some big changes. Three upgrades stand out in particular. Take a look.

More power consumption improvements

Google's browser is a known battery hog. At one point it got so bad that Microsoft was publicly criticizing Chrome engineers for destroying laptop battery performance. Part of the problem is that Chrome allocates far more processing power to tabs running in the background than do other browsers.

Google's browser now limits power devoted to unopened tabs at 1% of CPU consumption. But if you're using minimized tabs to stream music or video, don't worry, Chrome won't limit these. Engineers claim this change will "lead to 25 percent fewer busy background tabs."

Chrome for iOS gets a "Save for Later" feature

In what is probably a delayed attempt to catch up to iOS's native Safari browser, the newest version of Chrome for Apple devices will feature offline reading. To add to your reading list, just tap the Share icon in the upper right hand corner of the browser and select "Read Later." Even if you don't have internet, you can view content from both the Unread and Pages You've Read sections of your reading list.

Although not quite as convenient, earlier versions of Chrome on Android have a roundabout way of doing the same thing. When clicking the the download icon under the Menu dropdown, Chrome saves offline pages in local storage.

Better graphics on desktops

Chrome is also getting a serious boost in terms

of visual processing power. Google's browser now supports WebGL 2.0, which improves the speed, textures, and animated effects of elements on websites.

Support for WebGL has yet to make its way to mobile versions of the browser, but desktop improvements should put graphics on par with the 3D graphics in most modern games. Firefox and Opera already support this standard, but its addition to the most popular browser on the internet creates a huge incentive for web designers to push the visual boundaries.

New Law Limits Privacy Protections

The US House of Representatives and Senate recently voted to approve rules to allow Internet and phone providers to collect and sell consumer data about their online visiting habits which the President signed into law early in April. While this legislation benefits large businesses, it does not benefit small businesses or individuals who might want to protect their privacy.

Background

Much of the Internet is free but not really. You may visit websites that provide news or a community forum that are free. Or you may use apps on your phone or PC that are free. However, there is a definite cost to provide these websites and apps: someone needs to pay for developers and the hosting platform.

The way revenue is generated generally is by selling ads on the websites and in the apps. The ad providers want you to see ads that appeal to your demographics, income level and interests.

It's no secret that Google, Microsoft, Amazon, Yahoo and others are prolific in collecting data about you. And this recent legislation now allows your Internet and phone provider, such as AT&T, Verizon, Frontier, Comcast and others, to collect even more of your personal. The data collected by your Internet and phone provider is the missing piece of the puzzle because information brokers can link your name, address and phone number to your browsing habits and Internet activity.

There is a huge market for your personal data. Data brokers buy information about you from Internet providers, web properties, telephone companies. They then sell it to insurance companies, retailers, university admissions offices, employers, telemarketers and just about anyone who wants to know your personal details. Because the data broker industry is unregulated, it is rife with abuse as unscrupulous companies often buy data to scam people and sell questionable goods and services.

Your Personal Privacy Toolkit

One of the first things you can do is to start Using Firefox browser. Google is notorious for providing free products. However, using the Chrome browser and Google search engine allows Google to vacuum up all kinds of data about you. Microsoft, Yahoo and others have the same practices. Therefore, the first thing you want to do is install Mozilla Firefox and make it your default browser. Firefox does not share your personal data.

Use the DuckDuckGo search engine. This search engine does not store your personal data or history. You can change your default search engine in the settings of your browser. Hopefully you will be using Firefox.

Install privacy browser add-ons. There are three recommended add-ons or plug-ins for your browser that will block tracking cookies and ads and encrypt your browsing traffic: Privacy Badger, HTTPS-Everwhere, and AdBlock Plus. You can search and install these add-ons in Firefox settings – add-ons.

Use a VPN subscription service. A virtual private network (VPN) service will encrypt your Internet connection so your Internet provider will not be able to see your Internet activity. It is also a critical service if you ever use public WiFi. Choose a VPN service that you trust explicitly to protect your privacy and does not keep activity logs. The VPN service that we recommend and is an AXICOM vendor partner is Private Internet Access, or PIA, which costs about \$40 per year and works on your phone, computer and entire network.
